


Answer: This can be done only if it is spelled out in the club's bylaws as a requirement for membership. The club's bylaws are the rules the club has adopted and will supersede Robert's Rules of Order. If things are not spelled out in the club's bylaws we follow Robert's Rules of order. If Robert's Rules of Order do not address the item in question, then a member cannot be deleted from the membership roll.

110th Anniversary of Pierian Club Celebrated In Style

LAMPASAS -- The Pierian Club of Lampasas recently observed its 110th anniversary with traditional faire of punch, cake, nuts and mints served from crystal and silver. But members didn't rest on their laurels long before they began rolling up their sleeves to launch a fall fund raiser to benefit two of their longstanding projects: the Lampasas Public Library and the annual Pierian Scholarship.

Money raised during the 2012-2013 club year will mark Pierian support for the local library – including its very founding – since 1904. The photo of early club members dates from 1904 and was inspiration for the 110th birthday cake.

The annual Pierian Scholarship had its origins as a student loan program in the 1930s, and has since helped more than 70 deserving young students further their educations.

Pierian Club members see themselves as part of continuum of service that began in 1902, when club was organized in Lampasas and affiliated that same year with the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Silsbee Woman's Club honors Mae Pearl Ernst - In Memorium

EDITOR'S NOTE -- This story was written by Barbara Post and published in *The Silsbee Bee* on Wednesday, September 19, 2012. Some editing has been done by *The Clubwoman* but no cuts . . this tribute is too important to do that.

SILSBEE -- On October 31, 1957, a group of 15 Silsbee women sought to enrich their own lives and that of their small East Texas town by forming a woman's club. Among them was Mae Pearl Ernst, a regal lady with twinkling eyes and a quiet confidence. Decisions were made that very day to form the club.

The club would be affiliated with the Magnolia District of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. Membership would be limited for no meeting space was available except for the livingrooms of private homes.

When the time came to elect officers, all eyes turned to Mae Pearl. Soft spoken, immaculately dressed from hat to heels she exuded confidence. Elected President, her leadership set the tone for the club's remarkable success as it grew and prospered along with the city.

Mae Pearl was not a native of this small town dominated by timber and paper industries. Born in Leon County on April 11, 1910, Mae Pearl went from a two room school house to the dawn of the digital age.

Her family moved from Middleton to Centerville, where Mae Pearl graduated from high school. Her parents owned and operated a combined boarding house/hotel. It was there she met a young German immigrant who was doing geophysical work in the region. The two fell in love and married on July 11, 1931.

The couple lived in various locations in Southwest Texas and Southwest Louisiana during the first years of their 57 year marriage. During these first years, the couple welcomed the birth of their daughter Gretchen. In 1941, the family settled in Silsbee where Mae Pearl lived for 65 years.

A homemaker and avid gardener, Mae Pearl was active in the Daughters of the American Revolution and the

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Order of the Eastern Star, as well as a member of the Christian Church.

In 2005, and now a widow, she moved to Midland to be near her daughter. Mae Pearl died at the age of 102 on August 14, 2012. It was Mae Pearl's presidency that launched the Silsbee Woman's Club as a worthy supporter of education, the arts and civic improvement. Her legacy lives on to this day.

The county's seven clubs includes three Liberty Women's Clubs, three Dayton Women's Clubs and the Woman's Club of Cleveland. Each year a project is chosen to be highlighted. This year it was Children's Protective Service/Prevent Child Abuse America. Last year it was "Know Your Lemons", a breast cancer awareness program given to show women a funny way to learn about and to watch for changes in their breast that might be a precursor to cancer.

Fifty-seven members attended the meeting helping to raise \$800.00 that was then presented to CPS board members of Liberty County. Liberty County Children's Protective Service has more than 180 children currently in its care with more projected as the holidays approach. CPS is one of the many projects supported by the TFWC clubs.

The meeting is free for all members and guests. Entertainment is provided. This year's entertainment was a magician. And all the food is prepared by the attending members and served in a buffet setting. It is a fun, relaxing and totally enjoyable evening of friends and fellowship with no pressure to attend or provide anything beyond a dish. This is a great novelty and a welcomed change of pace for club women, who are always asked to, and do, so much for others.

Proceeds for the donations were raised from the sale of raffle tickets for a quilt. Made in cool and calm colors in the Zen pattern, the quilt was made and donated by Roberta Howard of the Woman's Club of Cleveland. A special thank you to Roberta for so generously donating the quilt, and to Billie Williams, President of Coterie Club of Liberty for providing the decorations, printing and providing the meeting programs.




