

From the Parliamentarian.....

PERTINENT POINTS TO REMEMBER

1. Parliamentary procedure is the application of parliamentary law to the business of a meeting. Its purpose is to insure order, expedite business, and maintain justice.

2. One of the first things to learn is the correct way to make a motion. After being recognized by the Chair: "I MOVE THAT.....,"



NOT: I want to make a motion, and NOT: I so move.

- 3. A motion is a declaration that the maker favors a proposition which he wishes the assembly to consider. The maker of a motion may vote against his motion, but is not permitted to speak against it.
- 4. A motion that limits, or interferes with the privileges of a member, or of the Assembly requires a 2/3 vote.
- 5. Voting in most Assemblies is done VIVA VOICE (by voice), unless the rules of the organization specify some other method such as BALLOT, RAISING OF HANDS, RISING etc.
- 6. The President may vote when his vote will change the results, i.e. he may vote when the vote is by ballot, and when his vote will make or break a tie.
- 7. The gavel is used to call a meeting to order (one tap) and may be used to adjourn the meeting (one tap).
- 8. When the Secretary calls the roll be certain to say: "Present" not HERE. In the army the men shout: "Here Sir."
- 9. A quorum is the number of members required to transact business. If not specified in the bylaws, a majority of the membership is considered a quorum. A majority is one more than half.
- 10. The recording Secretary rises to read the minutes. It is not necessary that she address the Chair, being called on by the chair is sufficient recognition.





"Is it a T-Rex?" I asked because that is one of the few dinosaurs I really recognize. Of course it was not, and I knew that. Riley had to patiently explain that it was 'actually' (He uses the word actually a lot because right now it is his favorite word.) a Triceratops, and he told me I could recognize them because they have three horns. Of course. I knew that, too!

"Grandmother, where do dinosaurs live?" Trying to tell a young child where they lived all over the world is something he would not understand, so I kept it local. Albany Study Club Members Works with Happy Hearts and Hands

Albany -- What prompts a small group of club women--of whom nearly one-half are ages 80 and above--to produce over 1,000 garments in one year? For members of Albany Study Club it is that--

- ! "Work is a song you sing with your hands,
- ! a song that makes the day seem right.
- ! Work is a song that echoes in your heart,
- ! a song that helps you sleep at night."

That line comes from a song featured in the Fort Griffin Fandangle, the city's 75-year-old outdoor theater that depicts the history of Shackelford County. Almost all of the club's members have participated in the show, either on or off the stage.

For the past four years, Albany Study Club has created a handmade quilt to raffle each summer as their major fundraiser. Gathering to work on the quilt in a sewing studio owned by member Emalyn Gillispie, members begin to sense a bond that drew them closer together and that stimulated the desire to do more with needle and thread. Independently, Albany Study Club members had, in the past, sewed hospital gowns for Operation Smile and breast pillows and lap blankets for M. D. Anderson Cancer Center. Those in kind donations were reported, but numbers were relatively small in comparison with what the club generated in 2012.

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Emalyn Gillispie, owner of The Sewing Room, cuts fabric to make a "no-no" arm band for Operation Smile.

"We had so much fun working on the quilt together that first year that we decided to meet and work on projects together once a month at the sewing studio," stated Emalyn Gillispie. "We began to notice that we enjoyed the camaraderie, and it was much more pleasant to work together to accomplish projects. Our conversations stimulated ideas, and collectively we set goals." Emalyn's studio has four sewing machines, a large cutting table, a serger, ironing board and iron, kitchenette and bathroom with plenty of room to accommodate eight to ten women at a given time. Club women ventured beyond the tiny hospital gowns and breast pillows and began to produce no-no arm bands and smile dolls for Operation Smile. It was Emalyn who challenged the group to cut, stitch and stuff one hundred of the dolls in 2011. No one dared to disappoint the 80+ year-old member whose generosity provided the workspace!

The idea of sewing pillowcase dresses and shorts for Little Dresses and Little Britches for Africa came from one member's visit to a Burleson quilt shop that displayed the dresses and britches and encouraged seam-

stresses to donate to that worthy cause. The women rose to that challenge and in 2011, sent items to LD/LB for Africa and about 30 garments to Haiti and 30 to Kenya with local church groups doing mission work in those areas.

With the mission work in mind, one club member suggested contacting Rafiki Foundation, a Florida-based organization that has ten orphanages in Africa's most impoverished nations. "We began by sewing the pillowcase dresses for the girls," according to

Mozelle Bartee who brought Rafiki to the club's attention. "The foundation thanked us for items we sent in 2011 and asked us to consider pajama bottoms for boys and nightgowns for girls." Patterns were developed and the work continued. "We were really inspired after receiving pictures of the children wearing clothes that we had sent." That was enough to cause the club women to increase the monthly work sessions into weekly meetings.

As word spread, community members began to show support with donations of thread, fabric and even money. "Most of the fabric and other sewing supplies have been donated," stated Sandi Conway. "However, we have received a grant from Walmart in the amount of \$500 this past year, and in 2011 we received memorial gifts from those honoring one of our members who had passed away."

In addition to breast pillows and lap blankets for M. D. Anderson, the club's president suggested sending those same items to the two cancer centers located in Abilene, 35 miles from Albany, and where many Albany cancer patients receive treatment. When contacted, both cancer centers

were thrilled to have the items. "We aren't slighting M. D. Anderson at all, we just increased the number of pillows and blankets to have plenty for all three facilities," Judi Draper said. Judi serves the group as the one who cuts almost all of the fabric used for dresses, shorts, pillows and arm bands. She takes fabric home with her and brings back pieces ready to be sewn.

Together in 2012, Albany Study Club has shipped the following items:

- 368 breast pillows, 67 lap blankets and 249 paperback books to M. D. Anderson
- 10 pillows and 10 lap blankets to Hendrick Cancer Center, Abilene
- 10 pillows and 10 lap blankets to Texas Oncology, Abilene
- 186 boy's shorts; 110 boy's pajamas; 185 dresses; 100 nightgowns; 21 pairs of socks; 105 panties; 80 tee shirts; 56 2-piece dresses; 40 3-piece skirt outfits to Rafiki Foundation
- 131 hospital gowns; 309 no-no arm bands; 9 lap blankets to Operation Smile

Those products are from a club of 27 members that manages the Shackelford County Library, provides summer-long children's reading activities; hangs and hosts a two-week long quilt show during June; awards two \$300 scholarships for local seniors; collects coupons for military families (over \$9,000); donates to Albany's food bank, Ministerial Alliance gift basket program and raffles a handmade quilt that funds club projects during the year.

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Carolyn Waller, club president states, "It's the combination of laughing together, encouraging one another, seeing the smiles of

African children in our homemade dresses and the musical hum from the sewing machines that makes our work "a song that you sing with your hands, a song that makes the day seem right."
