Dear Members:

We have made a lot of progress during these past two years and this officer will be here to work with your incoming President Carol Habgood. Together we will watch GFWC Texas become stronger and stronger!

We brought Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention "home" when one of our members discussed her violent history with her ex-husband. Funds were raised in the amount of \$4,000, and \$2,000 was given during this meeting to the Atascosa Family Crisis Center near Pleasanton, Texas.

We fought side by side with the Coalition Against Bigger Trucks and were successful in keeping the triple trailers off our roads for now, but our fight is not over.

We raised money for "Red Nose Day" and clubs have raised money for projects in your community.

Your president is very proud of all the hard work you, your clubs and districts have accomplished. Some of the things that you as members of this great organization accomplished this year include raising \$23,671 dollars for Canine Companions for Independence. We raised \$5,000 for the flood victims in Louisiana, \$5,000 for the Hurricane Harvey victims in Florida and generous donations across the United States by GFWC members in the amount of \$124,000 for the Texas Victims of Hurricane Harvey. We distributed \$19,000 to seven different schools in the affected area, \$18,000 to Magnolia District and \$18,000 to South Texas District for their distribution to those they felt were in need. Another \$21,500 was given to families, daycares and special camps for children. And of course today we distributed \$46,330.30 to five different libraries on the Gulf Coast that were affected by Hurricane Harvey. Over the last two years, through your generosity, hard work, and dedication, each and every one of you ladies in this organization have set a new GFWC Texas record totaling \$21,373,974. Ladies, give yourselves a standing ovation and a big round of applause!!

Patti's Peacocks were supportive and represented their districts in an energetic manner. The executive committee members have been the best! Anything that was needed, they were there for me and the organization.

It has been a wonderful two years, but it all began 16 years ago when the position of Pioneer District 2nd VP was accepted. Little did this officer know that she would be the 59th GFWC Texas President. There are so

many people who have mentored and supported me, this

president cannot even begin to name each of you, you know who you are!! Special thanks to my husband, my children, and my grandchildren. The true support has come from everyone of you ladies in this great organization.

Incidental Motions

Incidental motions relate in different ways, to the pending business or to business, otherwise at hand. An incidental motion is said to be incidental to the other motion or matters out of which it arises. As a class, incidental motions deal with questions of procedure arising out of 1) commonly, another pending motion; but also 2) sometimes, another motion or item of business. Most incidental motions are undebatable. With but few exceptions, incidental motions are related to the main question in such a way that they must be decided immediately, before business can proceed.

Some – but not all – incidental motions are:

Parliamentary Inquiry: A request for the chair's opinion on a matter of parliamentary procedure as it relates to the business at hand.

Request for Information: An inquiry to facts affecting the business at hand-directed to the chair or, through the chair, to a member.

Request for Permission to Withdraw or Modify a

Motion: After it has been stated by the chair.

Objection to the Consideration of a Question: Provided it is done before consideration of the question has already begun.




The TFWC Gavel --
