Did You Know?

May 14th is **Mother's Day!** Mother's Day is a celebration honoring the mother of the family or individual, as well as motherhood, maternal bonds, and the influence of mothers in society. It was first celebrated in the US in 1907, when Anna Jarvis held a service of worship at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia. Anna started her campaign for a national holiday to commemorate Mothers after her own mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, died. Ann Jarvis had been a peace activist who cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the American Civil War, and created Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues. It wasn't until 1914 that it became a federal holiday.

ABOUT JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

(Information for this article is from the resource entitled 'The History of Junior Membership" which was gathered at GFWC Woman's History and Research Center in Washington, D.C. The history of Junior membership in Federation goes back to the 1890s when leaders saw the need to have young women in the organization and to give them the ability to gain and the experience of leadership roles. This need for getting younger women into and involved in GFWC is still evident today as clubs experience shrinking membership.

Junior Clubs were first federated in 1895 starting up on the east and west coasts in particular. There were over 7,500 young women holding membership in Junior groups throughout the states in 1924. By 1930, Juniors representing 33 states attended the GFWC Convention in Denver, Colorado. The Junior Pledge, written by Mrs. Helen Cheney Kimberly, was adopted as the National Junior Pledge.

GFWC adopted the first four bylaws for Junior clubwomen in Detroit in 1935. This made Juniors a legally recognized part of the larger organization. "By 1944, all states but five were listed as having Junior state leaders. This is the same year GFWC abandoned any stand on the age limit, leaving this entirely up to the states."

Juniors received official recognition in 1952, when a Bylaw revision placed a Junior representative on the GFWC Executive Committee with the title "Director of Junior Clubs" which continues to this day. The first elected GFWC Director of Junior Clubs was Millie Crom who served in the 1952-1954 administration. Katie Moydell is the current Director.

In South Central Region, the only state with a Director of Junior Clubs is Louisiana. Louisiana has four Junior clubs with 60 members and one Juniorette Club with 39 members. Many regions throughout Federation have vibrant Junior memberships. As with other clubs, Ideas for projects are recommended in GFWC resources particularly through Juniors' Special Program: Advocates for Children and with Affiliate organizations such as Operation Smile, March of Dimes, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, United Nations Foundation Shot@Life Campaign, and UNICEF USA. As the Junior Pledge states, we should be "living each day, trying to accomplish something, Not merely to exist."
